What is practice-based research?

- Practice based research is research carried out in the real-world settings of clinical practices
 - Residencies can take part in practice-based research, too!
- Researchers and clinicians partner to design and implement research projects relevant to clinical practice
- Patients and other stakeholders are increasingly being included in practice-based research as part of the research team


Practice-based research provides participating practices and programs the opportunity to engage in innovative and important projects that find real-world solutions for challenges faced by primary care clinicians.



Practice-based Research Networks: PBRNs

- The Agency for Healthcare Research and Quality defines PBRNs as a group of ambulatory practices devoted principally to the primary care of patients, and affiliated in their mission to investigate questions related to community-based practice and to improve the quality of primary care.
- PBRNs have been described as the "laboratories of primary care research" and are an important driver for advancing clinical research into clinical practice in community settings (Lindbloom, et al. Medical Care, 2004)

The AAFP National Research Network: Members



- The AAFP NRN is the largest practicebased research network in the country
 - Over 2,330 primary care physician and clinician members
 - 850 practices
- Our membership is representative of primary care across the US

Rural Focus:

We recognize the importance of rural representation in research. Some of our longest-running and most active members practice in rural communities. However, we are working to expand representation of rural practices and increasingly include residencies in practice-based research.

Types of Projects We Do

Information Gathering

- Surveys
- Retrospective studies
- Point of care data collection
- Expert input on materials
- Interviews and focus groups

Implementation Effectiveness Studies

- Implementation research
- Pragmatic randomized trials: patient level or cluster randomized
- Comparative effectiveness research
- Research on patient engagement/participatory methods

Product Development and Evaluation

- Development of resources and tools
- Evaluation of processes, resources, tools
- Provider education tools and resources
- Evaluation of educational activities



PBRNs and rural practice and residency

- Gaps are created and inequities can be widened when rural practices, residencies, and their patients are not represented in research data
- PBRNs can provide an existing framework and structure for rural practices to contribute to research and even elevate their own observation-driven innovative research questions
- Participation in PBRN research can provide rural clinicians a way to elevate their voices and those of the members of the communities they serve



PBRNs and rural practice and residency

- Rural practices and residencies are underrepresented in PBRNs
- The map below depicts the headquarters (not member practices) for 77 registered PBRNs from the Agency for Healthcare Research and Quality
- While the AAFP NRN and many other PBRNs have member practices across all 50 states, many PBRN members are located in urban and suburban areas, with lower representation in rural areas



Addressing barriers and identifying facilitators for rural residency participation in PBRNs*

Factor	Barrier	Facilitator
Time	Everyone is busy Research can be a diversion	PBRNs with fully developed protocols can facilitate implementation of the study and engagement of residents/faculty in a program
Resources	Limited funding for incentives, supplies, etc.	PBRNs may be able to collaborate on grant proposals or bring opportunities to participate in funded projects with funding for research expenses
Expertise	No faculty with time to mentor residents or each other	PBRNs may provide opportunities for residents and faculty to collaborate with experienced researchers for scholarly activity
Topics	Residents/faculty may not be interested in opportunity presented by PBRN	Residents/faculty may be able to inspire the PBRN to undertake a project that emerged from their program

The future: Get involved in practice-based research!

Research Opportunities for Rural Clinicians

PBRN opportunities for clinicians in rural practices:

- Respond to a survey
- Serve on a study advisory board
- Contribute to a project to review or develop content as a subject matter expert
- Engage as an individual clinician in a study
- Engage your patients in a study
- Engage your practice and patients in a study
- Contribute as a study team member to development of grant proposals, development of research projects, analysis, and dissemination of practicebased research findings

All while connecting with new colleagues, sharing your knowledge and experience, learning from others, and ensuring a rural lens is brought to the team.



Research Opportunities for Rural Residencies

PBRN opportunities for residents in rural programs:

- Many of the opportunities on the previous slide may be open to residents
- Engaging in practice-based research as an individual or as a program can be a way to address resident scholarly activity requirements and faculty academic objectives
- Practice-based research can lend itself well to opportunities to engage cohorts of residents and faculty in short term projects or in various phases of longer term projects

All while helping new physicians establish a network, create ties to their community, connect with new colleagues, share their knowledge and experience, learn from others, and ensure a rural lens is brought to the team.



Conclusions

- Practice-based research drives research derived innovations into community practices
- Rural practices and residencies can ensure those innovations are fully informed including consideration of the needs of rural practices and communities
- PBRNs can provide rural clinicians and trainees with the opportunity to participate in research, building their capacity to continue to initiate and contribute to future research
- Engagement of rural practices and residencies in PBRNs allows for enrichment of the clinicians and the data resulting from the research they perform
