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

Densities calculated by the Rural Center based on 2014 U.S. Census population estimates.



⁻Counties in white do not have a geographic or population HPSA designation. Those counties either do not meet the criteria for HPSA designation or have not been reviewed.


Office of Rural Initiatives

William Kenan Charitable Trust

The Kenan Primary Care Scholars Program purpose is to increase the UNC School of Medicine students seeking rural health careers in North Carolina and to provide financial support and enrichment experiences to sustain their decisions. Kenan Scholars receive support during medical school and as alumni in residency. Medical school support includes summer stipends, scholarships during years two, three and four, one-time payments for Rural Residency Match, and a bonus for entering rural Primary Care Practice.


State Funding

RURAL MEDICINE PATHWAY PROGRAM

- Partnership with the Carolina Covenant Scholars
 office in the Office of Scholarships and Student Aid.
 Program for debt-free education for students
 meeting financial requirements. Providing access to
 any admissible student regardless of ability to pay
- Students apply first semester of sophomore year; preference for students from rural areas of NC with interest in medicine
- Program components:
 - Cohort-based student program (8-10 students per year)
 - Faculty mentorship and advising for pre-health
 - Summer stipend to support community-based research project
 - Scholarships in junior and senior year based on academic performance
 - Monthly meetings and seminars
 - Community service projects as a cohort

HIGH SCHOOL COMMUNITY EVENTS

- Partnership programs with high schools, local AHECS, community colleges
- Brings together multiple county high schools for health careers day hosted by UNC and community partners
- Hosted at local community college campuses to highlight the various pathways to health careers; utilizing strength of community college system as pathway to 4-year programs
- Local providers and current students serve on panels to share story of journey
- Hands-on stations (pre-COVID)
- Also host one on one high school presentations for health science classes, and other interested classes. Developing relationships with students as they complete high school career



Medical School Pipelining



- > Founded in 2013
- Began in partnership with MAHEC (Mountain Area Health Education Center)
- > Expanded (2017) to Central NC and SEAHEC (Southeastern Area Health Education Center)
- Longitudinal experience throughout Med School
- > Cohort-based experience





Rural Fellows Program



- Increased Responsibility of Rural Providers to Stay Up To Date
- Variance of needs in rural communities
- Required to perform a greater number of procedures in a wider variety of settings, including hospitalist work, emergency services, obstetric deliveries, anesthesia, and general office procedures
- When providers are able to perform specialized care in their office:
 - 1) Patients are more satisfied
 - 2) Continuity of care is improved
 - 3) Cost and wait times are less
 - 4) Physician satisfaction is improved.



Accomplishments

ORI Unique Opportunities: POCUS Curriculum



Rural POCUS Curriculum

- Provided butterfly ultrasound during summer experience and then during 3rd and 4th clinical years
- Didactic during summer experience orientation on knobology, common US pathology (skin, shoulder, and knee exam)
- Ongoing didactics during clinical years with opportunity for weekend long immersive course (with preceptor invited)

Goal and Objectives

- Ensure all students, independent of campus, continue to learn and practice Ultrasound skills
- Teach outpatient Ultrasound skills, appropriate of student's level of knowledge, in manners which can be practical to use in outpatient settings
- Continue cohort experience and relationships through large group online teaching sessions which are case-based
- Expand and provide small teaching points throughout the summer to further learning on outpatient Ultrasound skills
- Give feedback on Ultrasound skills to enhance learning and improve technologic skills
- Reflect on utility of POCUS in rural settings
- Utilize Google Classroom as a longitudinal learning tool students can access throughout their 4 years of medical school

Accomplishments



Scholarship and Curriculum

- Collaborative work to build out a new, shared, rural curriculum that will connect students statewide
 in the future around shared rural curriculum
- Successful COVID elective COVID + Community Health Center (PHS)
- Transition of Family Medicine Summer Academy to virtual experience to support students enrolled in the program
- Spanish Enrichment program offered to Kenan Primary Care Medical Scholars

Community Partnership

- Expanded clinical opportunities and service opportunities
 - During COVID, worked with Kenan Rural Scholar students who were not able to be in clinic for community service to coordinate volunteer services with Council on Aging in Chatham County

Accomplishments



Community / Faculty Engagement

- Rural Fellows Program
 - Partnered with Piedmont Health Services, UNC Family Medicine, and Chatham Hospital to recruit three new rural fellows involved in new Chatham Maternity Care Center to help new graduates maintain surgical skills through fellowship time
 - Supporting expansion of Women's Health Opportunities through support of Fellow who was recently named Medical Director of Chatham Health Department

Post-Residency Kenan and Promise Scholars

- Successfully placed 5 of 6 Kenan Scholars who have graduated from residency in rural practices in NC
- Hosted recruitment Event with representation from several rural practices and Office of Rural Health (NC DHHS) for graduating Kenan Scholars and Promise Scholars
