


Rural methodological considerations

- Defining "rural"
- Urban comparison (implied or actual) and/or within rural comparisons
- Sample size, representativeness, and variability
- Culturally/technologically appropriate approaches
- Research "on" versus "in" and "with"
- Protecting privacy / confidentiality of individuals and communities
- Generalizability to other rural populations

How to define "rural"?

- There is no one "right" definition. It depends on the research question.
- Whichever definition you choose can either over- or under-bound rural in some way.
- That choice will most certainly affect your findings.

Perception/identity-based measures

What best describes the type of place where you grew up?

Rural Suburban Urban

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What is the population of the community where you reside? ... your EMS agency service area? 0-50,000 50,001-100,000 100,001-250,000 etc.
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Rural identity predicts rural practice intent

Self-declared rural origin predicts medical students' intent to practice in a small city / town / rural area (as does rural high school county).



Commonly-used standard geographic definitions

- Based on population size, density, geographic isolation and interdependence/functional relationships with other communities
- Commonly used federal definitions:
 - **UICs**: Urban Influence Codes (county-based)
 - RUCCs: Rural-Urban Continuum Codes (county-based)
 - CDC National Center for Health Statistics Urban-Rural Classification Scheme for Counties (county-based)
 - RUCAs: Rural-Urban Commuting Area codes (Census-tract-based; ZIP code approximation available)
 - FORHP: Federal Office of Rural Health Policy Definition (county and RUCA-based)
 - FAR: Frontier and Remote Codes (ZIP code approximation)



Rural Definitions for Health Policy and Research

The term "rural" suggests many things to many people, such as agricultural landscapes, isolation, small towns, and low population density.

However, defining "rural" for health policy and research purposes requires researchers and policy analysts to specify which aspects of rurality are most relevant to the topic at hand and then select an appropriate definition. Rural and urban taxonomies often do not discuss important demographic, cultural.

evolved from a rural agricultural society to a society dominated by its urban population. Depending on which definition is used, roughly 20% of the US population resides within rural areas. Approximately three fourths of the nation's counties are rural, as is 75% of its landmass. While the rural population is in the minority, it is the size of France's total

periences. The term suggests pastoral landscapes, unique demographic structures and settlement patterns, isolation, low population density, extractive economic activities, and distinct sociocultural milieus. But these aspects of rurality fail to completely define "rural." For example, rural cultures can exist in urban places.¹ Only a small fraction of the rural population is involved in farmately to the situation at hand can we discern differences in health care concerns and outcomes across rural areas and between rural and urban locales. The definition of rurality used for one purpose may be inappropriate or inadequate for another.¹



Challenge: Measuring rurality of health care organizations


- Even if we use standard definitions, we have to decide how to use them.
- Example: In organizational research (where the organization is the unit of analysis), how to classify rurality of service or catchment areas?
 - Mobile health care: EMS and home health agencies
 - Large multi-site systems
- "Rural-serving" is sometimes the best way to describe.




Rural diversity, intersectionality, and health equity

- Health equity requires us to think about different types of rural places and different populations within rural places.
- Do both a rural/urban comparison and intra-rural comparisons if possible.
- Incorporate intersectionality at all stages of a project:
 - rural subpopulations: race, ethnicity, gender identity, region, sexual orientation, age, ability, religion, education, income...
- Go beyond documenting disparities from a deficit perspective to include solutions, strengths, resilience, lessons rural can offer to other communities.

Higher rural poverty – especially for Black, Indigenous, and Hispanic populations




RACE/ETHNICITY AND LOCATION BOTH MATTER FOR INFANT MORTALITY RATES


